### Preliminary Damage Assessment Report

# Rosebud Sioux Tribe – Severe Winter Storms and Snowstorm FEMA-4687-DR

### Declared February 20, 2023

On January 13, 2023, President Scott Herman requested a major disaster declaration due to severe winter storms and snowstorm during the period of December 12-25, 2022. President Herman requested a declaration for Public Assistance Categories B-G, including snow assistance and Hazard Mitigation for the Rosebud Sioux Tribe of the Rosebud Indian Reservation. During the period of January 3-20, 2023, joint federal, tribal, and local government Preliminary Damage Assessments (PDAs) were conducted in the requested areas and are summarized below. PDAs estimate damages immediately after an event and are considered, along with several other factors, in determining whether a disaster is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the tribe and the affected local governments, and that Federal assistance is necessary.<sup>1</sup>

On February 20, 2023, President Biden declared that a major disaster exists for the Rosebud Sioux Tribe. This declaration made Public Assistance available to the Rosebud Sioux Tribe of the Rosebud Indian Reservation. This declaration also made snow assistance available for a period of 48 hours for the Rosebud Sioux Tribe of the Rosebud Indian Reservation. Finally, this declaration made Hazard Mitigation Grant Program assistance available for hazard mitigation measures for the Rosebud Sioux Tribe of the Rosebud Indian Reservation.<sup>2</sup>

Information collected is used by the State as a basis for the Governor's request for a major disaster or emergency declaration, and by the President in determining a response to the Governor's request (44 CFR § 206.33).

When a Governor's request for major disaster assistance under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, as amended (Stafford Act) is under review, a number of primary factors are considered to determine whether assistance is warranted. These factors are outlined in FEMA's regulations (44 CFR § 206.48). The President has ultimate discretion and decision making authority to declare major disasters and emergencies under the Stafford Act (42 U.S.C. § 5170 and § 5191).
