COVID-19 Economic Recovery Resource Roadmap (Version 2.0)

This COVID-19 Economic Recovery Resource Roadmap (Roadmap) was developed to assist state, local, tribal, and territorial (SLTT) leaders and other interested parties with navigating some of the challenges, as well as the resources, associated with the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Specifically, the Roadmap describes how supplemental appropriated funds and certain ongoing annually funded federal programs can be used to implement potential solutions. Please note that this Roadmap is for general guidance purposes only and has been compiled with publicly available information or with information provided by sources that are publicly obtained. This should be viewed as only a starting point for navigating challenges and available resources. Additionally, the resources highlighted are available as of the date captured in the footer of the document and will be updated, as appropriate. The user should always directly consult the respective department or agency administering the federal program as the provider of a potential resource for current program information, as well as to verify whether proposed activities would be allowable under a particular program.

Navigating the Roadmap

The Roadmap is to assist in challenges that federal departments and agencies which work directly with SLTT partners have identified in delivering economic recovery support. Although not an exhaustive list, the identified challenges that follow fall within six topic areas:

- Market Uncertainty
- Business Viability
- Business Safety

- Workforce Health and Availability
- Community Infrastructure
- Sustaining America's Food Supply

Tables for each topic area provide information on specific challenges, potential solutions, and federal department or agency resources, including federal funding and technical assistance which may be available. Federal funding resources are either universal or solution-specific. Universal resources, for purposes of this document, have broad applicability to the solutions presented within the topic area, whereas resources directly linked to specific solutions are limited to the challenge presented. This information can help inform decisions on how to apply funding to maximize resources and achieve recovery outcomes. <u>Additional Resources</u> and an <u>Acronym and Agency Glossary</u> can be found at the end of the document.

Although the solutions are general in nature, additional considerations may be necessary to support those who may be at an elevated risk for contracting COVID-19, including those who may have physical, sensory, behavioral, or intellectual disabilities affecting their ability to conform to infection control protocols such as masking, hand washing, or distancing.



Challenge 1: Market Uncertainty

Business and Supply Chain Disruption: To mitigate the spread of COVID-19, many businesses halted production and operations nationally and internationally. As a result, many supply chains were cut and businesses faced liquidity challenges. As the Public Health Emergency continues, market uncertainty poses a challenge for businesses.

Additional Guidance for Business Viability

Business interruption and shutdowns as well as change in consumer demand has impacted business viability in many sectors. To support economic recovery, EDA** offers <u>Local Technical Assistance</u> to help promote economic development and alleviate unemployment, underemployment, and outmigration in distressed regions.

EDA provides <u>Economic Adjustment Assistance grants</u> to eligible recipients to capitalize or recapitalize lending programs that service businesses that cannot otherwise obtain traditional bank financing (and in limited situations to governmental entities for public infrastructure). These loans provide access to capital as gap financing to enable small businesses to grow and generate new employment opportunities with competitive wages and benefits. Financing also helps retain jobs that might otherwise be lost, create wealth, and support minority- and women-owned businesses.

Challenge 4: Workforce Health and Availability

Supporting Wellness of Workers: The COVID-19 pandemic may have health impacts on workers. Employers can provide additional support to ensure the well-being of their employees.

Addressing Unemployment and Labor Shortages: Some businesses had to furlough or lay off employees due to tightened cash flows, lack of work opportunities due to closed businesses, etc. Re-engaging these individuals will be important in economic recovery. For seasonal labor, some employees may find it difficult to obtain visas or work in the COVID-19 environment.

Additional Guidance for Workforce Health and Availability

<u>Rapid Response Services</u> provides resources for both employers and employees in re-employment opportunities for those recently laid off or furloughed. Additionally, EPA offers <u>trainings</u> to prepare unemployed and underemployed residents of waste-impacted communities for full-time environmental careers.

<u>Guidance</u> is available to help employers protect the health and mitigate the spread of COVID-19 mitigation in the agriculture industry.

To address mental health challenges, the Centers for Disease Control provides information on <u>coping with job stress</u> and build resilience during the COVID-19 Pandemic. Other <u>mental health information</u> regarding coronavirus is available through Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

For employees rights regarding paid COVID-19 related leave, the temporary rule and information is available through the Department of Labor's COVID-19 and the American Workplace guidance.

For seasonal agricultural workers needed visas, information on H2-A visas and subsequent impacts of COVID-19 are available.

Challenge 5: Community Infrastructure

Communities can support their businesses by providing investments and infrastructure improvements that enable businesses to stay open or reopen while taking public health considerations into account.

Commercial office space can take the <u>outlined steps</u> to ensure a safe and healthy workplace for workers and clients. Additionally, child care centers remaining open can review <u>guidance</u> for safe operations. Community revitalization efforts can also be supported by the Environmental Protection Agency's <u>Smart Growth strategies</u> and technical assistance.

The National Endowment of the Arts provides a list of organizations that offer <u>resources and support services for artists and arts</u> and cultural organizations.
